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

"SHEPHERDING AND LEADERSHIP"

Beloved Disciples of Christ,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

As we journey through these Easter days, I wonder, how has this season of renewal and rebirth been for you? Have you found solace in celebrating God's gift of salvation through Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection? Have you felt the joy of being embraced as a beloved child of God? Is

Alleluia still your song?

We celebrate the Sundays of Easter and are invited to ponder God's goodness for all of us. It was not easy for Jesus' disciples to believe in the resurrection from the dead, but He proved the truth about it through His appearances. He fulfilled His promise, especially that of being with them for all times, not in the manner that they used to be with Him, but with the eyes of faith that would carry them through the thick and thin of their lives and ministry.

On this Fourth Sunday of Easter, we hear Jesus' beautiful and profound teaching of being the Good Shepherd. This is why this Sunday is called Good Shepherd Sunday. Jesus presents Himself as One who would tend to His sheep and lay down His life for them. These words were concretely manifested when Jesus sacrificed and died for His disciples then and for every one of us. He manifested what true loving and caring were by offering His life to save us—the sacrifice of utmost service.

Compared to bad shepherds, who work only for pay and maybe for good reputations, good shepherds dedicate their time and lead their sheep to green pastures. They allow their sheep to grow and be filled. They protect and are ready to give their lives from prey and not endanger the

sheep by placing them in the sheepfold.

In all aspects of our lives, we are entrusted with responsibilities to tend and care for one another. Parents to their children. Managers to their employees. Presidents and governors to the citizens. And yes, Pastors to their flock. Should there be an image and model to follow, it is through the example of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Good Shepherd, who manifested what true leadership, service, and sacrifice are. He served and was not being served. He died for the sake of us all.

Shepherding and leadership are the same. We, who are being shepherded and led, must certainly know whose voice we need to listen to. If the voice we listen to leads us to only what matters here on earth, then we shift our listening ears to the voice calling us to those things that really matter in life and lead us to salvation. And this voice is the voice of the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ, the Redeemer of the world.

SCRIPTURE

In our diverse culture, the words of Acts may sound narrow and partisan: There is no salvation through anyone but Jesus. "Elitist" might be the kindest comment some would toss at those assertions. And perhaps they would sound arrogant if Jesus didn't also say, "I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). Jesus is the only shepherd, because it is only his voice that the sheep hear and recognize. Jesus knows his sheep, and in the Bible that means understanding and intimacy. Remember, Jesus is a king who reigned from a cross. He never lorded it over others, but sacrificed himself for them. The first letter of John says Jesus' own rejected him and refused to "know" him (3:1). Here, too, knowing refers to the deep understanding that results from intimate relationship. That intimacy was what many of Jesus' contemporaries rejected. Having rejected him, they also reject his followers. As Christ's followers, we recognize his voice. In ancient times, sheep grazed freely and flocks became intermixed. But shepherds had only to call and their sheep would hear and follow, responding to their shepherd's voice and no other. Jesus says, "the Father loves me" (John 10:17) because he willingly and obediently laid down his life. His sacrifice brought us into the sheepfold, or better, into the family of God, making us God's children. That's what we are now, but in the future, we know only this: we will resemble Iesus and be forever like him.

SHARING FAITH

John's letter has a "too good to be true" quality when it asserts we are, indeed, children of God. What else is "too good" and true about your faith?

If lesus is a shepherd, then we must be sheep. How would you defend that metaphor among those who might view the comparison negatively?

Invite each family member to name a quality of Jesus the Good Shepherd. Why did you choose that particular quality? What can you do to imitate the quality you chose?

LIVING THE LITURGY

Look up the word cornerstone in the dictionary or encyclopedia and reflect on its meaning. Then consider what cornerstone convictions you hold.

Keep an eye out for news stories of people who were adopted in infancy and find their birth parents as adults. Reflect on the impact and significance of discovering whose child one is. What does it mean to realize you are a child of God?

Provide cotton balls for sheep, green construction paper or felt for a pasture, and blue for water. Help your family set up a scene in which you can "shepherd" the cotton-ball sheep to the good green grass and the clean, still water. Talk about all that God provides for our needs and the responsibility we have to use his gifts well and wisely. Discuss the needs of others and how we can help Jesus provide for them by giving and sharing.
