

"BE STRONG, BE FIRM, AND BE PERSEVERING IN LIFE"

Beloved Disciples of Christ,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

From a human perspective, we desire wellness, avoid pain and suffering, delight everyone, and enjoy life with wealth, health, and all the good things. Suffering is unacceptable, especially in a culture that exhilarates much of riches and fame. Who wants to endure suffering or be mocked? None of us would say, "Me!" Our humanity, overwhelmed with pride and selfishness, makes it so.

For Jesus, it is different. He embraces the Father's will to sacrifice His life for us. Peter recognizes Jesus as the Christ, the Messiah, with power and might. He never expected Jesus, the Son of Man, to suffer greatly, be rejected by the elders, die, and rise after three days. Peter rebukes Jesus for saying such things, but Jesus rebukes him in turn, telling Peter that he thinks as humans do, not as God does.

Peter's confession of faith deepens our understanding of Christ's mission. Jesus, the Son of God, came to bring salvation, not in a lofty or admirable way, but through suffering, dying, and resurrection. This is why Jesus rebukes Peter.

Pope Francis' words guide us to cling to Jesus' teachings rather than the world. The call to suffering is to turn away from sinfulness, giving up our lives for Christ. The good things in this world are temporary. Knowing Jesus by heart allows us to profess our faith truthfully. Giving up our lives for the Lord brings true riches and happiness, testifying that Christ is indeed the Savior, the Messiah of the world.

Reflecting deeply, we recognize how to endure pain as Jesus did, trusting His grace and mercy to lift us as the Heavenly Father did. He gave Jesus strength, embracing it with love and care for our salvation.

Professing faith in Jesus means embracing all that life offers. Amid pain and suffering, it is crucial to remember what Jesus endured. We cannot only have faith when things go smoothly but also doubt when they go wrong. We may not see the wisdom yet, as Peter did not initially. But witnessing Jesus' journey, Peter became a staunch witness, even giving up his life for Him.

Let us be strong, firm, and persevering. Jesus is with us and always will be.

SCRIPTURE

Speaking of war, a 1970's rock song asks, "What is it good for?" and then insistently proclaims, "Absolutely nothing!" James says the same about faith that lacks good works. What we speak on our lips we must enact with our hands, otherwise our words are empty and have no power to change or heal or save. According to James, when love is just a feeling and not an action, it simply cannot do all that needs to be done. Lacking concrete action, words, however sincere, become hollow and impotent. Isaiah's Suffering Servant attests to that: his is a faith of action, not just words. He has been put to the test and passed. He has heard the word of God, and lived it both in good times and in bad.

When Jesus puts the question of the ages before the disciples: "Who do you say that I am?" (Mark 8:29). Peter offers the "right" answer. But then he quickly stumbles. He doesn't understand (and does not want to understand) that being love incarnate makes terrible demands on Jesus. Jesus is not just the love of God spoken into the world, he is God's love enacted in the world. He will not turn back or shirk from his brutal fate. That's why Jesus is so strong in his response. Don't tempt me, he tells Peter. I will accept love's demands. And if you love me, he says, you will, too.

SHARING FAITH

Setting your face "like flint" (Isaiah 50:7) means people may strike and spark a fire. Do you live your faith in a way that could cause sparks?

Denominations have argued about the relative importance of faith and works, which we see discussed in today's Second Reading. Have you considered that debate? Where do you stand on this important issue?

Who is Jesus? Once you've given all the standard answers, ask the question again.

LIVING THE LITURGY

Ponder Jesus' central question — "Who do you that say I am?" (Mark 8:29) — and depict with images your reply to that question.

Log the temptations you experience that compromise your faith. Each time you are tempted to take a shortcut or run the other way, write about it in a journal. After a week or two, take note of which temptations recur most often.

Spend time this week in family meditation on the cross. Share stories about people you know who have taken up their crosses without sadness or self pity: those who care lovingly and patiently for sick relatives, who make sacrifices to provide for the needs of disabled children, who forgive those who have injured them, and so forth. Help your family see these actions as demonstrations of faithfulness to God in the manner of Jesus Christ.

REFLECTION

"Then will the eyes of the blind be opened" (Isaiah 35:5).
