## FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK

### "AND THE TWO OF THEM SHALL BECOME ONE FLESH"

Beloved Disciples of Christ,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

The verse quoted above from our First Reading this 27th Sunday of Ordinary Time presents the original plan of God about the union of man and woman, indeed called Marriage. The teachings of Jesus validate it in the Gospel. He clarifies the indissolubility of Marriage when He says that no human being must separate what God has joined together. In Marriage, God unites man and woman in an unbreakable bond of loving intimacy and togetherness.

One of the highlights of Pope Francis' apostolic journey to the United States in 2015 was the World Meeting of Families. He recognized the value of families and inspired us as a nation and the world to bring up a family. He had this to say,

"Before He created the world, God was in love because God is love. The love He had within himself, the love between the Father and the Son, in the Holy Spirit, was so great, so overflowing – I'm not sure if this is theologically precise, but you will get what I am saying – that love was so great that God could not be selfish. He had to go out from himself in order to have someone to love outside of Himself. So, God created the world. God made this wonderful world in which we live and which, since we are not too smart, we are now in the process of destroying. But the most beautiful thing God made – so the Bible tells us – was the family. He created man and woman. And He gave them everything. He entrusted the world to them: "Grow, multiply, cultivate the earth, make it bear fruit, let it grow." All the love He put into that marvelous creation, He entrusted to a family." (Address of the Holy Father at the B. Franklin Parkway, Philadelphia, on September 26, 2015)

Marriage has to be seen in the light of what God intended to be at the beginning and the light of the dignity of the human person. It entails commitment, fidelity, truthfulness, respect, and unity. It is knitted in love, strengthened, and nourished by it.

It is also worth noting that this month is called Respect Life Month. Every aspect of human life starts from a beautiful, loving relationship between spouses knit by God's blessings, that is, in the Sacrament of Matrimony. At the moment that spouses make their vows expressing themselves to be faithful to one another in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love and cherish until death do them part, it empowers them to journey in life and faith with God, with one another and with their children.

There are many attempts today to change the view on Marriage. But Christian tradition maintains its position based on Christ's teachings and not on human understanding and acceptance of Marriage. This Sunday's readings invite us to ask ourselves and our society for ways to strengthen and value Marriage and the Christian family. It is also a call for spouses to continue the loving relationship despite all the challenges and situations that might hinder its growth. It reminds those engaged to start envisioning a life worth being called husband and wife and knit it in Matrimony!

# **SCRIPTURE**

Loneliness is, perhaps, the greatest of modern afflictions. Despite e-mails and cell phones, it's difficult to feel like, in the words of the poet John Donne, "a piece of the continent, a part of the main." Millions surround us, but we can still feel like "islands" in the vast ocean of life. In the beginning, we were meant for oneness. Man and woman, scripture says, were made for each other. No other partner was fitting for the man. Woman alone, made not from the clay of the ground as was Adam but from the man's own rib, was suitable. Once, this was a simple and readily accepted concept. But today, the waters are murkier. Some say anything

Some say anything that reduces the loneliness of modern life should be praised as good and godly, so and view marriage between a man and a woman as just one option among other options. Maybe that's why Mark follows Jesus' citation of the Genesis text and his hard teaching on divorce with the episode in which Jesus calls us to be childlike. Children are not necessarily nice or sweet. In fact, they can be downright cruel. But children readily trust and depend on others. Those are the child-like qualities Jesus wants us to emulate. Maturity and wisdom can help us avoid cruelty, but when our brains and hearts head out in opposite directions, only childlike trust can enable us to embrace the hard teachings of the Gospel.

# **SHARING FAITH**

Do you see evidence of loneliness in modern culture? How about in your own life? What are viable antidotes to loneliness?

The almighty, eternal Word of God became "lower than the angels," that he "might taste death for everyone" (Hebrews 2:9). When you reflect on that humility and generosity, how does it impact your willingness to give of yourself for others?

God is love in a community of persons. How does your family fit this same description? Your parish? How can you encourage loving community around you?

# LIVING THE LITURGY

Observe a child for an extended period. Try to discern the childlike qualities Jesus was (and was not!) asking us to emulate if we would possess the kingdom.

Take a poll of at least ten people. Ask them if Roman Catholic teaching on divorce and remarriage is a biblical principle that comes from Jesus, or a law created by the Church.

Reach out to someone who is alone. Invite a lonely neighbor to join you monthly or weekly for supper, a movie night, or some other treat. Volunteer to read aloud to someone who is sight impaired. Offer to lead a craft activity at an assisted living facility.
