

SCRIPTURE

It would be tempting to dismiss today's texts as grist for some movie maker's terrifying script. Since Hollywood loves avenging angels and stars falling from the sky, we could say, "Let's leave them these gloomy images and focus instead on Gospel light." We could point to various distortions of these apocalyptic texts found in popular culture and some religious sects and say, "True Christian faith is not meant to be scary." With that, we could wash our hands of these hard sayings and move on to more pleasant texts. But if we did, we would dilute — if not betray — Christ's Gospel. Without losing sight of the hope we have in Christ, we must still face the true before us.

An end will come — for all of us collectively and for each of us individually. So, in these final weeks of the liturgical year, we remind ourselves of our mortality and of the need for readiness. That's where Daniel and Mark come in. More important than the obvious truth of life's eventual end is what they tell us about being ready. Daniel says those who are wise and lead others to justice have nothing to fear, for as the world darkens and sun and moon cease to shine, the righteous will brighten the firmament with their own light. Jesus tells us to be as smart as farmers who know and heed nature's signs. Believers must recognize and heed the signs of the times — signs that will signal the inevitable end of all things and the return in glory of the Lord who will deal with us as we deserve

SHARING FAITH

What does it mean to be "wise" in God's eyes? Does it have more to do with knowledge or with obedience?

Do you think it's healthy to at least periodically consider your own mortality? What do you do to be ready if the time comes like a thief in the night?

Jesus tells us that no one but the Father knows when the Son of Man will return. If it happened today, is there anything you would wish you had done that you have not?

LIVING THE LITURGY

Don't wear a wristwatch for a week. Every time you look at your wrist and find the watch missing, remember that one day time will stop for you individually and for all of us.

Decide what three things you would do differently in your life if you knew for sure you had only three months to live. Fully expecting that you will have 100 years to live, do those three things anyway.

The prophet Daniel tells us that those who work for justice will shine like the stars forever. With your family, learn about some of our Catholic defenders of justice. Dorothy Day, Saint Maximilian Kolbe, Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton, Saint Vincent de Paul, and Saint Martin de Porres are a few examples. Ask your parish Director of Religious Education if the parish has children's books or videos that you can borrow. Discuss how these people lived in anticipation of the coming of Christ.
