

"OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST THE KING"

Beloved Disciples of Christ,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

We end another liturgical cycle with the Solemnity of our Lord Jesus Christ the King. The prophecy of Daniel and John in the Book of Revelation recognizes the splendor, dominion, glory, and kingship of the Son of Man. In the Gospel, Pilate asks Jesus if He is the King of the Jews. Jesus replies that His kingdom is not of this world. As the Church leads us to understand the meaning of all the celebrations we have gone through this year, it comes to recognizing the Lord as the One who will rule our lives. If we are faithful members of the kingdom here and now, we will eventually share in the kingdom that He will establish when He comes again.

For us to realize His kingship, we respond to His call. Jesus Himself says in the Gospel, "Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." The truth about Him and His teachings lead us to recognize Him as our Lord and King. It draws us to be servants of the Master. It causes us to act in a manner worthy of the kingdom. Acceptance of Him, His word, and his example enable us to

be transformed into genuinely becoming sons and daughters of the Father.

Before we again enter into the Season of Advent, this Sunday or week will be an excellent time for self-reflection. Let us gather our thoughts and see where we are at concerning our spiritual path. We had been challenged with many things that caused us to resign or give up. Family, work, health, and so on are overwhelming concerns. It is challenging to embrace the truth, but many of us have been tested to give up, and many are holding on to Jesus. The only way we can keep on living the best of our lives is to look at Jesus, who Himself suffered severely but was victorious through His resurrection. He truly exemplifies what it means to trust in the will of the Father and face with courage the sufferings He had to endure.

In this light, when we look to Jesus and embrace Him, we can always see the brightness that Christ has brought into this darkened world, And, holding on to our hope in Him, we will all get

through whatever adversity or adversities come our way.

May Jesus Christ, our King, reign in this world and our lives. And may our celebration help us understand what it takes to live and follow the Lord. Ultimately, we will rejoice in proclaiming Jesus Christ as King, now and forever.

SCRIPTURE

Jesus' life was full of irony, and the end was no different. Today's readings paint that irony with broad brush strokes. Daniel's visions herald the advent of the Son of Man who receives "dominion" and "glory" (7:14). The regal trappings of kingship are laid at his feet and all people bend low to serve him. But in John's account of the Gospel Jesus stands before a mediocre magistrate to whom fate has given full power over Jesus' life. Pilate asks Jesus to proclaim what kingship he possesses but Jesus won't oblige. He parries with Pilate, asserting that his kingdom is not of this world. When Pilate tries to seize those words, Jesus throws them back at him and claims his only mission was to speak the truth. Jesus won't be cornered. He gives no pat answers and forces Pilate to recognize the truth that stands before him. If Pilate can't do that, no words from Jesus will make a difference. The satisfaction Jesus refuses Pilate is also not given to us. There are many more things Jesus might have said, many proofs he might have given, but he didn't. We must make a leap if we want to stand with Jesus. It will take faith, which is the assurance of things not seen. To be his loyal subjects and disciples we must take Jesus as he is — as Pilate had to — and believe the king of glory dwells in this unlikely figure who challenges us to accept that life is so much bigger than ourselves. Pilate sensed all that but lacked the courage to follow his heart. Let's pray we find the courage to follow ours.

SHARING FAITH

What aspect of the truth of Jesus speaks more powerfully to your heart: his regal eternal majesty, or his humble human life?

Do you ever reflect on the fact that faith and religion are only a means to an end, not an end in themselves?

Jesus, our King, doesn't rule with an iron fist, but with a tender heart. How does following such a king affect the way you look at things?

LIVING THE LITURGY

Kings wear crowns and carry scepters, but Jesus' only crown was made of thorns. Next time you buy or receive a bouquet of roses, remove one of the thorns and contemplate the type of kingship Jesus was willing to embrace for our salvation. Store the thorn where you keep your car keys, so you see it as you go off to start your day each morning.

Sometimes religious feasts grow out of the political or social circumstances of their day. Find out what prompted Pope Pius XI to institute this feast in 1925.

Take your celebration of Christ the King out into the world. Make crown-shaped cookies for a homeless shelter, soup kitchen, or neighbor. Make crown-shaped cards for shut-ins. Offer to make a crown-shaped pizza or cake for your parish youth group's next event.
