

SCRIPTURE

A new year! Sometimes it is amazing how time flies. Once again, with the First Sunday of Advent, the Church begins a new liturgical year — Year C in the three-year Lectionary cycle of readings. In this year, the Gospel readings are primarily taken from Luke's account of the Gospel. The liturgical year is not in sync with the 2010 calendar year which begins January 1. This now is the beginning of our new year, a time of hope and fresh insight. What better way to begin than by inviting the Lord to teach and guide us!

Today's readings give us a focus not only for Advent, but also for the entire year. God desires justice and reminds us to be faithful to our covenant as his people. Paul reminds the Thessalonians of the love that bonds this community to Christ and tells them to continue the work of upholding the covenant. Jesus tells his disciples to be ready and vigilant at all times. Do not give up hope, stay faithful to the covenant, be ready, and love one another — these sound like good new year's resolutions!

SHARING FAITH

Name one way you will focus yourself spiritually during Advent.

Where do you want God to enter your life this Advent? How will you prepare this place for the Messiah?

What is one Christmas custom you could delay during Advent so you can better focus on being ready and vigilant for the Lord's coming?

LIVING THE LITURGY

Write a new year's letter to yourself during the weeks of Advent, outlining your hopes for living the Gospel during this coming year. Save the letter and open it at the beginning of Advent next year. Share your insights and reflections with family or friends now and later.

Create a roadmap or timeline laying out your past life journey as you have tried to be a faithful follower of the Messiah. Use drawings, symbols, or images. A small group or family could tell their history together or recount what they've done, discussed, or faced together as a group. Continue to trace this coming year on your own or together with your group.

Discuss with a group or your family how you might keep the Advent season holy without the cultural and societal demands of the Christmas season pressuring you to stop anticipating and start celebrating early.
