Like the three men of faith, may we never lose hope that we can become better if not the best, when we embrace the Lord in our lives. By listening to Him and experiencing His mercy, we will always have the opportunity to motivate our lives and others to be gracious and righteous. May we be inspired to serve our communities, support the vulnerable, and be beacons of God's love in all that we do.

May we all be inspired to recognize our own limitations and sinfulness and be resolved to live righteously and devoutly as children of God and disciples of the Lord.
