

#### "PILGRIMS OF HOPE IN THE LENTEN SEASON"

Beloved Pilgrims of Hope,

Greetings of peace, love, joy, and hope!

Ash Wednesday gently ushers us into the serene Season of Lent, a sacred time bestowed upon us to reflect on God's boundless goodness, kindness, and mercy. This divine goodness springs from the profound sacrifices Jesus endured for our sake, paving the way for us to savor the gift of salvation through His Passion, Death, and Resurrection.

On this first Sunday of Lent, we are reminded that life cannot be without temptations. Jesus Himself faced the devil's allurements to satisfy His hunger, to gain power and glory, and to seek comfort and security. Temptations offer an easier path—stealing to avoid toil, neglecting the poor to hoard resources for personal pleasure, being unfaithful for momentary thrills, and lying to escape difficult situations. However, does yielding to these temptations bring true peace of mind or lasting joy? It does not.

During this Lenten journey, we are called to confront our true selves and address the changes needed in our lives. We are invited to delve deeper into our hearts and minds, redirecting our paths to live in grace rather than sin. Though temptations are real, we are also capable of turning away from them, as Jesus demonstrated. He is our strength, enabling us to overcome the devil's enticements and triumphantly live in peace and joy through Him.

This year, the message of the Jubilee Year of Hope further enriches our Lenten reflections. Pope Francis has called us to be "pilgrims of hope," emphasizing that hope and kindness touch the very heart of the Gospel. The Jubilee Year invites us to embrace God's love, mercy, and compassion, even amidst the challenges and temptations we face. It is a time of grace, mercy, and reconciliation, encouraging us to open our hearts to the hope found in Christ, who is the Light of the world.

As we journey through Lent, let us remember that the door of God's heart is always open. The Jubilee Year of Hope reminds us that we can always return to Him, seeking His forgiveness and love. By embracing this message, we can find the strength to overcome temptations and live in the peace and joy that Jesus offers.

#### **SCRIPTURE**

Every moment of the Israelites' exodus journey from Egypt to the Promised Land, their God was with them, saving, redeeming, and delivering them from oppression. Through their struggles to be faithful and resist temptation, God heard their cry and stretched out his arm to protect them. The chosen people could trust that their God would never abandon the people he loved.

During his sojourn in the desert, Jesus was filled with and led by the Spirit of God. In his encounter with Satan's temptations, Jesus had faith that God's power was with him. He trusted that God would never abandon the Son he loved.

Now it is our turn to trust. Lent is a time to begin a journey with God. This journey might prove to be dangerous and to bring surprises to us. We know it led Jesus to Calvary and the cross. The traditional practices of praying, giving alms, and fasting during the journey can lead us to reform (or form again) our lives and return our hearts to God's saving power and grace. God will never abandon us on this journey.

#### **SHARING FAITH**

What are your images of a Lenten journey of transformation?

During Lent, we are drawn into remembering the Paschal Mystery — Jesus' suffering, death, and Resurrection. How does your life reflect this mystery?

When you find temptation in your life this week, how will you call on God's help?

## LIVING THE LITURGY

If you don't have a crucifix hanging in a room where you spend a great deal of time, consider hanging one there for Lent. Try making a crucifix out of faces from newspapers or photos to remind you that God came for each of us. Take a moment each day to offer a prayer to the Lord asking for help in being an example of his merciful love that day.

Lent is a journey of personal examinations. On Ash Wednesday uses Jesus' words to his disciples to give us three good markers for reforming our lives during this season: give alms, pray, and fast. Reflection takes time. Schedule time for a retreat (short or long) during Lent.

Read all of Psalm 91. The psalmist speaks the first verses (1-13) and God speaks the concluding verses (14-16). Journal about what you understand from this exchange between humanity and God.

## REFLECTION

We cried out to the Lo r d , the God of our fathers, and he heard our cry and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression (Deuteronomy 26:7)
