

"EMBRACED BY MERCY: A JOURNEY OF REDEMPTION AND LOVE"

Beloved Pilgrims of Hope,

Greetings of peace, love, joy, and hope!

On this Fourth Sunday of Lent, we are invited to reflect on one of the most touching and powerful parables that Jesus shared with His disciples and listeners: the Parable of the Prodigal Son. This story, often titled as such, tells of a son who squandered his inheritance on reckless living and vices. The goodness he received from his father was repaid with a life of temporary gratification and meaningless pursuits, leading him to a state of desolation and self-realization. He no longer saw himself worthy of being called his father's son and sought to be treated as a servant.

When the son decided to return to his father, he was met with an unexpected and overwhelming welcome. His father embraced him with love and mercy, celebrating his return with a grand feast, a ring on his finger, and a party fit for royalty. In his humility and shame, the son confessed, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you." Yet, the father's love was so profound that he did not even need to utter words of forgiveness; his actions spoke volumes of acceptance, love, and kindness. Who could be such a father? Who possesses the ability to show such overwhelming kindness to a wayward child?

This parable reveals to us the nature of our God—a loving and merciful Father who awaits each of us with open arms. God continuously calls us into His embrace, full of mercy and compassion. The key to experiencing this divine welcome lies in our awareness and willingness to change. Human weakness often leads us away from God, but like the father in the parable, God is always at the door of His mercy, ready to forgive and transform our lives.

The embodiment of this unconditional love is made even more real when He sent His Son, Jesus, into the world and was handed over to death. Such love can draw our minds and hearts to a changed life and lead us to live in a manner of being called sons and daughters of a Loving, Merciful Father. Drawn to this profound thought gives us the hope to live a better life, focus on Jesus, and turn away from our sinful path.

Let this season of Lent guide us deeply back to Him, restoring our dignity as sons and daughters of God.

SCRIPTURE

Having a friend forgive a wrong we have done is a great relief. When someone pardons us after we've hurt them, it brings peace and healing. How much greater is the release we feel when God forgives our failings! Jesus' suffering and death and the promise of new life through the Resurrection are the heart of our Lenten journey.

Jesus came to save and reconcile us with God the Father through his death on the cross. Through Jesus, the Father offers us something we could never accomplish ourselves. Only God could conceive so gracious an act of justice and mercy.

But God also extends to us the invitation to share the message of his graciousness and goodness. By reconciling us in such a radical and generous way, God invites our reflection on how we have been forgiven. Then God entrusts us to give the same gracious and generous forgiveness to others, to those who have offended us or caused us pain. By becoming God's ambassadors of reconciliation, we transform the world into a new creation.

SHARING FAITH

What are messages of reconciliation you want or need to receive in your own life?

Who might need to hear a message of reconciliation or healing from God, the Catholic Church, a small faith community, or you?

What would a world look like that is transformed by God's grace, using humans as ambassadors of reconciliation?

LIVING THE LITURGY

Choose a particular person in your life who you believe has hurt or wronged you (the person may not be alive or even live near you). Reflect on what God may be asking you to do in this relationship. Begin by adding this person to your daily prayer life.

Have a discussion with a group about an ambassador's role (such as to another country or to the United Nations). What is their job? What qualities do they need? How do these ideas and images relate to being an ambassador of reconciliation for Christ?

The elder brother is faced with a choice at the end of the parable of the prodigal son: "Your brother was dead and has come to life again" (Luke 15:32). If he acts with the same generosity and forgiveness as his father, imagine what the conversation might be between the two brothers as they reconcile. What would you say if it was your brother?

REFLECTION

And all this is from God, who has reconciled us to himself through Christ and given us the ministry of reconciliation . . . entrusting to us the message of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:18)
