

### **SCRIPTURE**

Have you ever played "freeze tag"? It is a game where one person is "it" and has to try to tag everyone. Once you are tagged, you have to freeze in place and stay in that position until someone who is still free is able to run up and tag you, or everyone is tagged and the game is over.

This game is a good metaphor for what Easter Sunday means for us Christians. We have been frozen, locked in place, in darkness and sin. But the Savior has come into our frozen and broken world. Our lives have been touched by the saving power of Jesus Christ and we have been freed from the slavery of sin and destruction. Like Mary of Magdala or Simon Peter and the other disciple, we may not totally understand what it means to be free. We may seem as uncertain or as anxious as they were at the empty tomb. But we know that with the dawning of Easter morn, something new has happened. Our lives have been unfrozen; we can touch one another with wonderment over the power of the living God. Alleluia!

### **SHARING FAITH**

From what anxiety, fear, or frozen state can the risen Christ free you during this Easter season?

What does the light of Christ coming into the world mean in your own family, community, or neighborhood?

Create a collage of images of new life and pray with it during the Easter season.

### LIVING THE LITURGY

Burn a white candle during the Fifty Days of the Easter season. Like the candles we use during Advent, use it to remind you of the ways we are called to celebrate our new life in Christ and our life as disciples. Light it during meals, in the evening as you say prayers, or during quiet times of reflection. Draw or paste symbols on it as we do to the Paschal candle we use during Easter.

The First Readings of the Easter season are from the Acts of the Apostles, the second volume written by the Evangelist Luke (the first being his account of the Gospel). Read or study the chapters of Acts and make a list of how a community of believers and followers of the Lord is called to act.

In Christ, we are a "new creation." Do one thing this Easter season to celebrate the gifts of creation that God has given us.

### REFLECTION

He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead (Acts 10:42)
