

"LOVE AS HE LOVED: A CALL TO FAITHFUL DISCIPLESHIP"

Beloved Pilgrims of Hope,

Greetings of peace, love, joy, and hope!

Our Gospel Reading on this fifth Sunday of Easter brings us back to the time that Jesus spent His last supper with His disciples. It was the night when He would be handed over to death because of Judas' betrayal. How sad it was that at the moment when Jesus was talking about giving a new commandment to love one another as he had loved, his betrayer had left. He missed a very important moment that would probably be a life-changing moment for him. But for those who were left behind, indeed, it was a turning point in their lives, and they indeed love the Lord just as He had loved them. Their love for Jesus was testified by giving up their lives totally for their Master and the people they served. Indeed, Jesus' commandment to love one another as He had loved was not just a sentimental kind of love but a love of faithfulness and sacrifice, a total dedication to Him.

Throughout Jesus' ministry, it was characterized by love. He made the deaf hear, made the crippled walk, the blind see and the dead live. Not only that, He preached conversion, repentance, and salvation, but also walked this earth in pain and death. He experienced the gruesome way of

Maybe we can start to show kindness and compassion even with small acts like listening to someone in need or offering encouragement to the downtrodden. Also, to forgive freely, serve others, love beyond boundaries, live generously, and practice empathy. When we love truly, we live fully, and hope becomes alive!

SCRIPTURE

In the Gospel, Jesus gives his new commandment to "love one another" (John 13:34). It couldn't be briefer. It couldn't be clearer. And, to the extent that it is taken seriously in daily life, it couldn't be more challenging!

The disciples know the challenge. Just before this, Jesus washed his disciples' feet in a powerful, symbolic action of service and love and told them to do the same. It's one thing to wash your friends' feet or even your beloved Lord's. But disciples must wash the feet of all to follow the command to love one another.

These are powerful and challenging words. Perhaps they make us nod our heads in agreement or shake our heads in disbelief. We want to follow, but we know how difficult it will be. We have seen where it led the Messiah. But if we do follow, if we love as Jesus asks, if we trust God will send the Spirit to guide us, we will see the new Jerusalem promised in the reading from Revelation.

SHARING FAITH

Why do you think Jesus washed feet before speaking of this new commandment? How is it an ultimate sign of love?

The reading from Revelation includes powerful images of comfort. What do the words mean to you?

Where are you called to act in love so that others will know you are Christ's disciple?

LIVING THE LITURGY

Make a poster of people's feet either with shoes or barefoot, in mud or clean. When you have finished, hang it on the wall and pray over it for a few days. Then, in a group, read the passage from the Gospel about washing feet as a sign of love and service. Talk about all the ways we are called to wash feet (not just literally).

With a group, begin to make some cards for Pentecost. Use scripture quotes from readings of the Easter Sundays. (Today's Revelation reading has some beautiful images.) Send cards to people in your neighborhood or parish, or to your friends who may be going through difficult times and need a message of hope. Be a sign of the presence of God's loving Spirit to them.

Paul and Barnabas encouraged many disciples along their journey. What words do you think they spoke to strengthen their spirits and persevere in spreading the Gospel?

REFLECTION

This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another (John 13:35)
