

"FULFILLED IN CHRIST: A EUCHARISTIC JOURNEY OF HOPE"

Beloved Pilgrims of Hope,

Greetings of peace, love, joy, and hope!

Today, we join the universal Church in celebrating the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. It is a sacred day to pause, reflect, and cherish the mysteries that Christ has entrusted to us as His disciples. In offering Himself completely, out of a love that is both profound and freely given, He invites us into communion with the divine. By celebrating this Eucharistic feast, especially on Sundays, we are once again drawn to the heart of our faith: His supreme act of love and sacrifice.

As we gather at the Table of the Lord during this Jubilee Year of Hope, we are reminded that the Eucharist is not merely a ritual but a profound encounter with Christ, who nourishes us with His very self. This holy season calls us to renewal – to rekindle our hope in God's promises, recommit our lives to joyful service, and be living signs of Christ's love in a world yearning for meaning and

peace.

The Gospel presents us with the powerful miracle of the feeding of the five thousand, a crowd so great that women and children weren't even counted. What is most striking is that everyone ate and was satisfied. This was no mere distribution of food; it was an abundant gesture of divine providence. Their hunger was met not only with bread and fish, but also with the generosity and compassion of the One who provided it. They received more than just sustenance; they received the presence of Jesus, the true source of all fulfillments.

In today's world, many seek satisfaction in wealth, power, pleasure, or fleeting accolades. Some fall into traps of addiction or empty pursuits, believing these will satisfy the soul. Yet such paths often lead to isolation, weariness, and breakdown. The Jubilee of Hope urges us to lift our gaze and rediscover the hope that does not disappoint, the kind that flows from faith in Christ, who gives

Himself so that we might truly live.

Let us therefore shift our hearts toward what endures. In the Eucharist, Jesus offers us not only His Body and Blood, but also His love, His mercy, and His unfailing grace. As St. Peter reminds us, "Cast all your worries upon Him because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Jesus saw the hunger of the crowd, and He sees ours too. He satisfies us with more than food; He offers Himself entirely, so that we may be filled with life and hope.

May this celebration serve as a moment of renewal for each of us, a Eucharistic moment that transforms our hearts, strengthens our mission, and sends us forth as joyful witnesses of the Gospel.

SCRIPTURE

In the reading from the Gospel according to Luke, the Twelve have five loaves and two fish and so they tell Jesus to send the crowds away to find their own lodging and food. Jesus, however, wishes to do otherwise. Earlier, Jesus had instructed the Twelve for their mission saying, "Take nothing for the journey, neither walking stick, nor sack, nor food, nor money, and let no one take a second tunic" (Luke 9:3). It seems they have quickly forgotten they need not worry about having enough to eat.

With the small amount of food, Jesus feeds all five thousand. An impossible task becomes possible through Christ! On the solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, we celebrate with great joy the gift of the Eucharist. Jesus, by giving us his body and blood, gave us the possibility of new life. Go forth from the Eucharist following Jesus' command to his disciples to share what we have received. Trust God and there will even be leftovers!

SHARING FAITH

Jesus broke bread, shared wine, and offered his body and blood for us. When have you felt broken? When have you shared yourself with others? How has God been present to you in these experiences?

Where might you offer compassion and care to a person experiencing hurt or pain?

How does God ask you to give from what you have and feed others?

LIVING THE LITURGY

The disciples wanted to dismiss the crowds to take care of themselves. Jesus wanted to do otherwise. Who gets dismissed by our society or even by us? Who does Jesus invite us to consider feeding (literally or figuratively)?

Abram gave a tenth of everything in gratitude for Melchizedek's priestly service. Abram acted in a spirit of stewardship by doing this, giving something from his own sustenance. You might also read the story of the widow's offering in Luke 21:1–4 for another example of stewardship. What do you believe about stewardship? What effort do you make to tithe your time, talent, and treasure? Examine your own or your family's effort to give in these three ways to your parish and other charities.

Bring food or a meal to a sick neighbor, soup kitchen, local pantry, or a family with a new baby.

REFLECTION

The Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." (1 Corinthians 11:23 – 24)
